Reception

The highlight of this half term was The Nativity! The children worked hard to learn all the songs and they looked amazing in their costumes. They were so brave to perform to such a large audience. Their confidence has grown immensely and they should all be proud of their achievement. A lot of our work this half term has been learning the story of the Nativity and becoming familiar with the characters of the story. Over the last few weeks, the children have enjoyed working with clay, building up their skills of shaping it and adding texture and details. I'm sure you will agree that the bowls they bring home will make a perfect addition to your holiday decorations. Please add a tea light and enjoy!

We have continued to learn new sounds in Phonics and we have been impressed by everyone's progress. The children have made good progress at reading and spelling words. Their writing has also improved and everyone is now confident to have a go at some writing. In math's, we have been working on being able to identify how many there are in a small group of objects without counting. This is an important skill that helps with understanding what makes a number. We have also been investigating circles, triangles and 4-sided shapes and looking for them in our environment. Why not play a game when you are out and about or at home to spot shapes you can see.

Year 1

We can't believe that it's the end of term already! We have been so busy and the children have been working really hard.

They have all loved learning about The Great Fire of London. We have been so impressed with their enthusiasm and their retention of facts. Please do ask your child: Where did the fire start? Year 2 Newsletter December 2024

The children have been incredibly busy since our last newsletter showing all that they can do. We've had snow, rain and even some moments of sunshine!

In Maths we have been working on addition and subtraction. We have started to look at 'exchanging' when completing these operations and, even though it is difficult, it is lovely to see how much perseverance the children have when trying something new.

In writing, we have been learning how to write instructions and followed instructions to make vegetable soup. We hear many of you have been making your own soup at home too! The children have been learning how to write hooks and instructions, as well as remembering to include bullet points and numbers for the order. Thank you to those who came to Parents' Evening recently. It was great to spend time chatting about the children's strengths and areas of development.

It was so lovely to see so many of you at the Christmas performances last week. We were so impressed with the children's resilience at learning a variety of songs, playing a new instrument and learning lines to read out. Many of the children were a little nervous about the performances so all of the children should be commended.

In line with Redstart's policy on reading, we expect the children to be reading 4 times a week and recording this on their calendar. In January, when we have checked on a Friday, those children who have not recorded 4 times reading at home will be invited to attend a Reading Club for a few minutes in their lunch time or play time. This is to ensure that all the children have the opportunity to read and progress. Thank you to all those who continue to read with their child at home and practise their spellings.

Year 3

As we approach the end of the term, we are delighted to share the wonderful learning and achievements of Year 3.

This term, the children have been busy creating their own innovative stories inspired by "Lila and the Secret of the Rain." They have explored story structures, learning how to create engaging beginnings, build suspenseful middles and create satisfying endings. They all used their impressive creativity and imaginations!

In Maths, the focus has been on mastering the written methods for addition and subtraction. We have seen great progress in understanding and applying these methods to solve problems. Using these methods has supported the children's confidence when handling numbers and carrying out calculations.

Our science lessons have been filled with excitement as the students delved into the topic of light and shadows. They have conducted experiments to explore how light travels and how shadows are formed. It has been wonderful to see their enthusiasm and engagement in learning about the natural world.

As the festive season approaches, both classes have been getting creative with preparations for the Christmas performance and crafting beautiful Christmas decorations. We hope you all have a lovely Christmas break. Thank you for your continued support throughout the term. We look forward to seeing you all again in the new year!



Year 4

We have thoroughly enjoyed our Tudor unit! We have been painting our Tudor portraits, sewing an embroidered piece inspired by Mary Queen of Scots, researching some Tudor Christmas facts and writing our own story about meeting Henry VIII. We especially enjoyed our trip to Athelhampton House and this week have been creating leaflets all about Athelhampton from our own experience. A massive thank you to FORS who subsidised the trip for each child to reduce the cost for you. We have absolutely loved teaching this topic and we are certain the children have learnt lots too! Our next unit of work will be William Shakespeare and A Midsummer Night's Dream.

In Maths, we have continued to learn our times tables and have built on formal column methods for addition and subtraction. Please encourage your child to keep practising their times tables over the holiday as they soon forget them! For Literacy and Guided Reading our texts and writing have all enhanced our Tudor knowledge and understanding. As always, the more your child reads, the more progress they will make across the entire curriculum. Any reading you can fit in during the Christmas break will really benefit them on their return to school.

Thank you to all of you who were able to attend our Parent Consultation Evening. It was lovely to have the chance to discuss your children's progress with you. As we said on the night, if you have any questions or queries, please don't hesitate to contact us via the office or at the end of the day.

We hope you enjoyed our joint Christmas concert with Year 3. The children worked really hard, and we were very proud of their performance, as we hope you were too.

Year 5

What a fantastic, full-packed first term Year 5 have had. Well done!

In Maths, this term has been a very busy one with lots of new concepts being learnt. We have learnt how to use long multiplication as well as new words such as square, prime or cube numbers. We have also learnt about decimals with up to 3 decimal places and have begun using percentages. Loads of cool things! This learning will be supported by Maths homework which acts as revision. Please remind your child to practice their times tables over the holidays as they are easily forgotten!

In Literacy, we concluded our Oliver Twist study by designing a new Charles Dickens character and introducing them to Oliver Twist in a short narrative. Our non-fiction unit was looking at the non-fiction style of writing within a biography. Children then used a list of facts to write a biography on Charles Dickens.


We have now finished our topic work of 'Victorian Britain' by looking at what Victorian children would do for work and how they would spend their leisure time (if they had any!). This topic has allowed the children to compare the life experiences between rich and poor Victorians. We all enjoyed the trip to Bristol to see the SS Great Britain where we gained extra knowledge about the Victorian life.

We were really pleased to win the Christmas Tree Festival. Thank you to all who voted for our tree.

In this last week of term, the children have enjoyed three days of Design and Technology projects. They have been using their sewing skills to make a new case for their headphones and in small groups, they have designed and built bridges based on our design criteria. Please continue to encourage your child to read over the Christmas holidays and record it onto their log sheet which will be checked on the first week back. No Maths homework or spellings will be set over the holiday.

Year 6

It has been a busy end to the term for us in Year 6 with lots of hard work and the finishing of our topics for this term.

One of the highlights of learning about World War Two was our VE Day celebration day. We loved seeing the children in their outfits and their efforts with the Lindy Hop dance impressed us all! They also had the chance to try some traditional war time biscuits and to play some games. We have finished our World War Two topic by considering the consequences of the war and the legacy left behind. Linked with this was our Art lessons where the children created a piece of artwork inspired by Graham Sutherland called "Devastation".

In our Science lessons the children have carried out an investigation into the effects of exercise on their heart rate. This followed some learning about healthy lifestyles and how the circulatory system works.

We have ended the term learning about fractions in our Maths lessons. We have learnt about equivalent fractions and how to simplify. We also converted improper fractions and learnt how to compare and order. We will continue to work on fractions after the Christmas holiday and cannot stress enough how important times table knowledge is in helping with understanding and completing this work. Please encourage your child to work on these if they are not confident in recalling these facts up to 12×12 . We have very much enjoyed getting to know the children over the Autumn term and we wish you all a restful and healthy Christmas holiday. We send our good wishes for a happy 2025 and thank you to those parents who were able to attend our Christmas carol service. We hope you enjoyed it and left feeling suitable festive!



Forest School

We have had a very good term at Forest School. The weather has been mixed - everything from torrential downpours to snow to warm sunny days to very cold grey days! As always, whatever the weather we do always try and get out for at least some of the day. Hence, please carry on supporting us by making sure children have a waterproof coat and welly boots whenever they have Forest School.

The recent winds have unfortunately damaged two quite sizable trees and these will have to be taken down. Luckily, over the last ten years we have planted over 800 trees so, while the loss of mature trees is always sad, we have planned for the future! The older children continue to work hard developing their use of secateurs, shears and loppers to help maintain our meadow and hedges.

Nearly all children have had the opportunity to build camp fires, cook hot chocolate and toast marshmallows. We try hard to make sure we have alternative drink and food for children with special dietary requirements. However, this is not always easy - the best solution is for you to provide us with a little named box with an easy to heat drink and biscuit that you know is suitable for your child. We can then keep this in the cupboard so whenever the class do some Forest School fire-making we know there is something for everyone.

We follow the latest Government Guidance to ensure we are fulfilling our duties in this important area. How we keep our pupils safe at school

All staff and volunteers are trained in how to recognise signs of abuse in children and the internal processes for the reporting of such concerns. Whilst all members of staff are on hand and willing to speak to children who may be upset or concerned, we also have child -friendly posters displayed around the school and on the main board in the school hall with photographs of the Designated Safeguarding Leads who the children may also ask to speak to. Every child will also be aware of the ‘Worry Boxes’ in their classrooms where they can write and post their concerns should they wish to do so. Please do remind them of this option

What to do if you have a concern

Should any of our parents/carers or members of our local community have a concern about any child, you may contact a member of the safeguarding team. Alternatively, you may report your concern directly to Somerset Children's Social Care on **0300 123 2224**.

Where parents and children become aware of abuse happening within a school setting, it is also possible to contact the NSPCC helplines:

If you feel you or another child is in immediate danger, please call 999.

Attendance

School Attendance - information for parents/carers

As per our attendance policy, the school undertakes regular monitoring of attendance to ensure that, where required, help and support is offered at the earliest opportunity.

In order to ensure parent/carers are kept up to date with their child's attendance record, the school will send out letters at specific intervals, for example, where there have been frequent absences or where attendance has fallen below a certain percentage. This is regardless of whether absences are authorised or where the school has been kept fully updated with the reasons for absence.

We do appreciate that it can be frustrating to receive a letter when your child has suffered absences which could not be helped i.e. where there is a rule to stay at home for 48 hours. Where the school identifies concerns (unexplained, sporadic or lengthy absences or continued lateness) parents/carers will be invited in for a meeting to discuss what support the school can provide to improve attendance.

We thank all our parents/carers for continuing to update the school office where your child has been unable to come into school.

If your child is unable to attend school due to a medical appointment, please ensure you provide us with evidence of their appointment. This could be a letter from a hospital or GP or even a screenshot of an appointment email or text.

Also, please do not inform the school that your child has an appointment or is sick if you are, in fact, going on holiday. At Redstart we teach the children the importance of integrity and this is undermined if you ask them to lie about where they have been. It is most likely that we will find out anyway since children like to talk about their lives outside of school. We would rather you were honest and we can code your child's absence correctly and know that they are safe.

Food Parcel Support

If any of our families are in need of a food parcel, please contact the school office and ask to speak with our Early Intervention Lead, Mrs Margetts. The food parcel service is provided by the Community Hub in town. Referrals made are treated confidentially. It is a 'no questions asked' service. You do not need to explain your circumstances unless you wish to and there are no income thresholds to meet to qualify. Some families may require a little support for a short time or there may be reasons for longer lasting support.

10 Top Tips for Parents and Educators SAFETY OVER THE FESTIVE SEASON.

The holiday season, marked by Christmas and New Year, brings joy and togetherness but also presents unique safety challenges for children, families and educators. From busy holiday shopping, traveling and family gatherings to managing digital activity during school breaks, staying safe during this period requires heightened awareness. This guide offers practical tips to help families and educators maintain a more secure and fulfilling festive period.

1 MONITOR DIGITAL ACTIVITY

Children spend more time online during school holidays, increasing exposure to potential dangers such as cyberbullying, inappropriate content and online predators. Balancing screen time, avoiding harmful websites and ensuring children engage positively online can be difficult without proper monitoring tools. Set clear boundaries, encourage open discussions about online safety and use parental controls to manage content exposure and screen time effectively. Regular check-ins and positive reinforcement around digital habits encourage safe online behaviour.

2 PRACTICE FIRE SAFETY PROTOCOLS

The incidence of house fires increases during Christmas due to greater use of candles, candles and electrical decorations. Open fires, electrical overloads and the need for quick response plans can make fire safety challenging. Ensure smoke detectors are operational, keep fire extinguishers on hand and teach children how to respond in case of a fire emergency. Avoid leaving candles unattended and use fire-safe candles to prevent mishaps.

3 CREATE TRAVEL SAFETY PLANS

More families tend to travel during the holidays, resulting in busier roads, increased traffic congestion and weather-related hazards. Weather conditions, road signs, fatigue and busy airports can all compromise travel safety. Pack emergency kits and ensure all essential items. Plan routes in advance and allow extra travel time to avoid rushing and mitigate risks on busy roads.

4 BEWARE OF ALLERGIES

Holiday meals often involve many foods that may contain allergens. Cross-contamination, unclear labelling and lack of allergy-friendly options can lead to severe reactions. Communicate any allergy needs to hosts, provide safe food alternatives and carry necessary medications like antihistamines or EpiPens. Teaching children how to advocate for themselves and recognize dangerous foods also contributes to safer celebrations.

5 PREVENT THE SPREAD OF ILLNESS

Cold weather and seasonal socialising can increase the spread of viruses like flu and COVID-19. Crowded gatherings, schools out of session and frequent travel can lead to higher infection rates. Emphasize hygiene, encourage vaccination, identify symptoms and isolate symptomatic individuals. Communication with children about proper hygiene practices is essential to reduce the spread of illness.

6 STAY VIGILANT ON THE ROAD

Increased holiday traffic heightens the risk of accidents for both drivers and pedestrians. Distracted driving, pedestrian safety and inclement weather can compromise road safety. Encourage pedestrian safety practices, avoid distracted driving and never drive under the influence.

7 MAINTAIN SAFE DECORATIONS

Festive decorations such as Christmas lights and candles can pose electrical, fire and choking hazards if mismanaged. Frayed wires, toppling Christmas trees, small ornaments and open flames can be difficult to control, especially in busy households with children. Inspect and maintain decorations, secure Christmas trees, place fragile or small items out of reach and ensure candles are never left unattended. Using flame-retardant decorations can significantly reduce risks.

8 SET BOUNDARIES FOR GIFTS

Some toys and gadgets can present choking, sharp-edge or safety risks, particularly for young children. Insuring that gifts meet safety standards and are age appropriate can be complex with so many options available. Inspect all toys carefully and ensure any tech devices have parental controls. Setting expectations around safe gift use and discarding packaging that poses a risk also helps to prevent accidents.

9 ADDRESS STRESS & FATIGUE

Holiday pressures can lead to burnout, which affects both physical and mental health. Overpacked schedules and a lack of downtime can cause stress and fatigue, leading to accidents or poor decision making. Incorporate rest, maintain regular routines and seek support to reduce stress. Encourage activities that promote relaxation to create a healthier, happier holiday experience for everyone.

10 DRINK RESPONSIBLY

Alcohol is commonly present at holiday events, raising concerns about safety and supervision. Excessive alcohol consumption can lead to accidents, impaired judgment and lack of supervision for children. Designate responsible adults, limit consumption and provide transportation alternatives for guests. Teaching moderation and modelling responsible behaviour in front of children ensures that celebrations remain positive and secure.
